FEATURED COLLABORATIONS

Our EcoReps helped support a variety of large-scale events aimed at highlighting the work of our office and our many colleagues and collaborators' sustainability contributions. See some highlights from our year below.

TRANSPORTATION FAIR





In August, our EcoReps helped organize the Transportation Fair. This collaborative event at the Bell Tower provided students with the opportunity to learn about different resources to get around Philadelphia sustainably.

WORLD FOOD DAY





World Food Day, held in October of 2023, gave Temple students, faculty and staff the opportunity to explore how different student and community organizations and university departments are taking initiative to make Temple and the extended community hunger free.

EARTH DAY EXPO





The Earth Day Expo, held on Earth Day this past April 2024, provided students with the opportunity to learn about initiatives to promote sustainability on campus through student involvement, departmental research and action plan development.

IMPACT

Our EcoReps program supports a wide range of in-person programming to integrate sustainability principles into all aspects of campus life. Our programs look to foster relationships with campus and community partners through thoughtful, engaging, and innovative in-person events. Through our EcoReps program our peer facilitators support anchor programs that increase our in-person impact towards building a sustainable culture on campus and beyond.


TEMPLE THRIFT & GIVE + GO GREEN

Give + Go Green and Temple Thrift are two annual programs that establish circular systems to minimize waste impact and retain economic value through redistribution and reuse of commodities on campus. In the 2024 fiscal year, Temple Thrift raised \$8,164 through four sales and the support of 174 volunteers. These sales were supported by clothing donations from Give + Go Green, our annual donation collection and sustainable move-out program. In May of 2024, 47 Give + Go Green volunteers collected and sorted 4,082 pounds of clothing donations and 699 pounds of food donations. The food is taken directly to the Irvine Barnett Cherry Pantry and the clothes will be sold at our Temple Thrift sales in the fall semester.









ZERO WASTE

In May of 2024, our EcoReps piloted Temple University's first-ever zero-waste event at the Green Building United Sustainability Symposium. EcoReps staffed various waste stations throughout the symposium to assist attendees with disposal, while also providing education on the importance of waste diversion efforts through composting, recycling and reusable dishware.







WALK AUDIT

The Walk Audit Training Certification program is an original service-learning curriculum that teaches students how to evaluate the pedestrian experience. In October of 2023, the Office of Sustainability partnered with Clean Air Council, Feet First Philly and West Mount Airy Neighborhood Association to evaluate the pedestrian experience in high-risk areas of the West Mount Airy neighborhood of Philadelphia. Through this program and its skill delivery in asset-based community development and community organizing, it presents walking as a model for sustainable behavior change and active and engaged urban stewardship. The walk audit is run every fall semester.







CLIMATE CAFE

In partnership with the Climate Psychology Association of North America, The Office of Sustainability developed our Climate Cafe program. Facilitated by EcoReps, Climate Cafe is a peer-led series of workshops to address topics of eco-grief, climate anxiety and other associated feelings surrounding climate change. These peer-led sessions are facilitated by EcoReps to give the Temple community the opportunity to develop coping skills and strategies to promote and protect student wellness and engender resiliency. Climate Cafes are held in both the fall and spring semesters throughout the school year.







STORIES OF SUSTAINABILITY

Stories of Sustainability is a speaker series dedicated to telling Temple's stories of sustainability—our students, our staff, and our faculty's tales of climate action. With Stories of Sustainability, we hope to give a platform to share best practices and discuss the latest topics in sustainability to fuel climate action on campus. This past fall, as part of our Stories of Sustainability series, Becki Beadling, earth and environmental science faculty, held an interactive workshop to discuss the role of the ocean in a changing climate and how we can use both climate models and observations to improve our understanding of climate change. Stories of Sustainability are held in the spring and fall semesters of the school year.







WEIGH THE WASTE


In partnership with Dining Services, the Office of Sustainability hosts Weigh the Waste. Held every spring semester, this campaign utilizes student staff and volunteers to collect, weigh and divert post-consumer food waste in the dining hall. This program works to educate diners on the importance of limiting food waste, while also directly working to divert the collected food to compost. This past spring, over 52 unique student volunteers worked our Weigh the Waste station at J&H Dining Hall for one week in January and two weeks in March. Across this timeframe, our team diverted 3,003 pounds of post-consumer food waste from the landfill.

WISSAHICKON VALLEY PARK

In September, our EcoReps took an excursion using SEPTA Regional Rail to the Wissahickon Valley Park. Just minutes away from Temple's campus, this transit-accessible park gives students the opportunity to immerse themselves into nature without leaving Philadelphia.



TUSCULUM GATEWAY GARDEN W/NKCDC

This past spring, programming leads led several excursions to Tusculum Gateway Garden just east of Temple's campus to assist with several garden bed build days. In partnership with New Kensington Development Corporation, these programs gave students a great opportunity to build community partnerships through urban agriculture and stewardship activities.



DISCOVERY CENTER

This past winter, our EcoReps partnered with Audubon Mid-Atlantic to take a weekend trip to the Discovery Center for a bird tour of the Strawberry Mansion Reservoir. Students were able to utilize local transit to tour this critical stop on the Atlantic Flyway for migrating birds.






SPRING 2024
